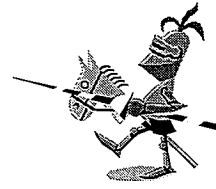


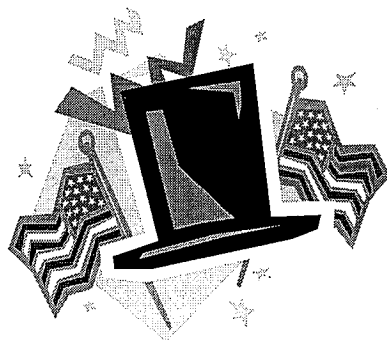

The RTR District along with 27 other school districts is looking at a flexible learning year. This will allow the students to have two additional weeks of instruction over the current school year to prepare for the state required testing. The area school districts are continuing to make progress on developing a plan for a "Flexible Learning Year" program. The administration requested approval of the board to submit the application. The board granted the approval.

The board has reserved time for questions and/or comments for the public regarding the Fiscal Year 2010 budget and the 2009 Payable 2010 Levy. There were no questions from the public in regards to the budget, or the levy. The school board reduced the levy payable for the 2010 – 2011 school year by \$60,000 to reduce the pressure on the taxpayers.

Race to the Top is a federal grant ran through the State of Minnesota. This program is basically the federal government's version of the state of Minnesota's version of Q-Comp. The compensation for both of these programs is performance-based. This is a four year grant application, and the district is to notify the Minnesota Department of Education if they desire to take part in the application. The RTR Board of Education approved notifying the state of the district's interest in the program.

The board reviewed the Superintendent's evaluation for the year with a result of 4.02 out of 5. The board also approved the contract for the 2009-10 school year.

The school board set February 15th as the make-up day for the school day missed in December for weather.



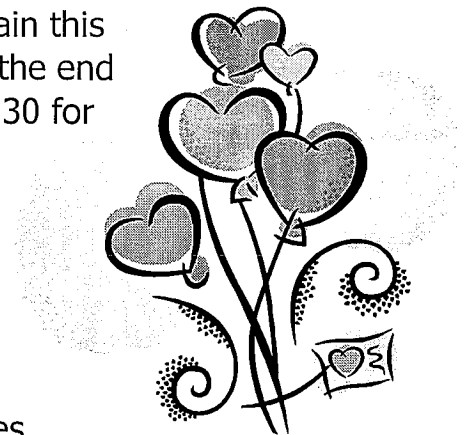

January 5th four fifth grade students including Gwyn Duus, Grade Ekema, Courtney Petersen, and Katie Petersen attended the 18th Annual Conference for Young Writers held at Southwest Minnesota State University (SMSU) in Marshall. Approximately 700 students in grades 3-8 enjoyed the keynote show of comedy, music, and ventriloquism by David Malmberg of Richfield, Minnesota.

After the keynote presentation, students attended three hands on classes selected about writing and illustrating. They learned techniques for generating ideas, publishing stories, and how to draw cartoons for their work.

A special feature of the conference was Ben Heckmann, a 12 year old boy from Farmington, who shared the book he wrote, illustrated, and had published last April at the age of 11. The book entitled Rockin' Out With Writing: How to Write and Illustrate Your Own Book showed students, no matter their age, writing a book is possible.

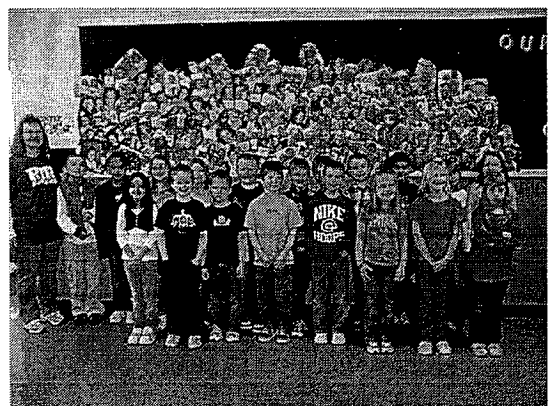

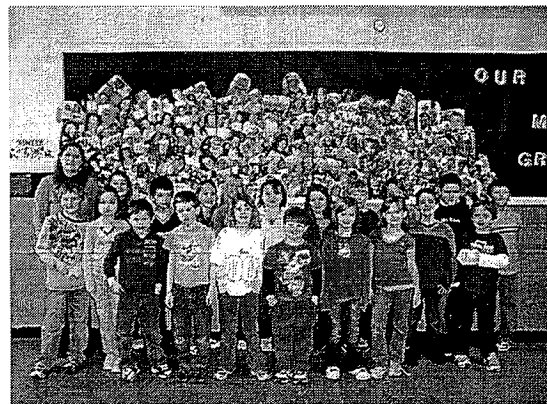

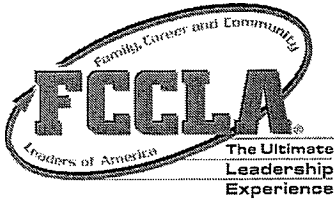

Brief Bits from Mrs. Bush

When you have students at the high school, winter is a very busy season. There are many basketball games (I counted 21 in January), practices for the team members, play rehearsals, end of the semester projects and tests, beginning of semester two courses and coursework, ACT tests, Snow Week activities, FFA contests, FCCLA preparations for the Star activities... and the list goes on.

It can be very difficult to keep students motivated to do homework or study for tests with all the other activities that go on. As a parent you can help by setting aside a regular time and a place in your home for your student to study and by expecting your student to have homework to do. Rather than "you don't have homework, do you?" try "let's turn off the TV so you can get going on your homework." Studies show that homework done in front of a TV or with music is not as efficiently or as accurately done. Finally, make sure you continue to learn and share what you learn with your student. By modeling your learning, you help your student understand the importance of learning in his life.

A View of Iraq

Mrs. Joosten's and Mrs. Andersen's sophomore, junior and senior high school social studies classes had the opportunity to learn about the country of Iraq and the war in Iraq as SSG Jeff Reisodorfer from the Minnesota Army National Guard came to speak. Having spent 16 months in Iraq, Jeff had many interesting pictures and stories to tell. He told us about the wildlife, weather and living conditions he encountered. With the temperatures going over 120 degrees, having an abundant supply of water was extremely important. He explained the differences between the Arabs and the Kurdish people, and he shared many cultural customs of the Iraqi people. He also explained how much control the dictator, Saddam Hussein, had over the people in most aspects of their daily life, and how big a change it is for the people to learn how to be more independent.

Jeff described and had pictures of many of the weapons and pieces of equipment they used. He explained thermal imagery and how prototypes for equipment are developed. Putting money into equipment to better protect the lives of our soldiers is a top priority of our government. This is particularly evidenced in equipment to detect roadside bombs, probably the number one threat to the safety of our soldiers. One thing that really stood out for me personally was the need for the soldiers to constantly be vigilant to their surroundings. They were always looking for what "wasn't right," because that awareness might be what saves their life. Jeff also described the types of missions they would go on, with most of the soldiers who are presently deployed from our area providing security for convoys for the many civilians who are working in Iraq.

Spending two days at the school, Jeff told us so many interesting things. He was very well received by the students at RTR High School, and we all felt fortunate to be able to learn about life in Iraq. Thank you Jeff!

Personal Fitness Class

This year at the high school we are offering a new class called Personal Fitness which is an elective for 11th and 12th grade students. This class was added due to the emphasis on personal health and fitness of our teens as well as the fact that our fitness facility offers students equipment to accomplish many fitness goals. This class allows for students to set individual fitness plans to help meet their fitness needs or to enhance their abilities.

Various components of fitness are targeted such as muscular strength, endurance, cardio-respiratory endurance, flexibility, and body composition. Students set up goals associated with resting heart rate, target heart rate, BMI, and helping to establish an individual healthy weight range. During this class students are monitored and tested to evaluate their progress. Students also work with analysis of nutrient intakes and determining healthier diets.

The class for first semester had 16 students and at least that many will be taking the class second semester. This class has been a nice addition to our curriculum and many students like this type of fitness class due to the non-competitive nature and that it is individually based.

Make School Days Great Days

By 2nd grade, you and your child may feel confident in the art of getting off to school on time. Build your success by making sure that your child is really ready to learn every day.

Keep a routine. Kids thrive on predictable events. Try to keep bedtime, wake up time, breakfast and dinner at the same time as much as possible.

Fuel up. For kids, food is fuel. Make sure your child has breakfast each day. Protein is a great start to the day, so try a serving of eggs, peanut butter or yogurt.

Make room for homework. Your child may have some homework. Although it may take just a few minutes each evening, begin making homework a part of your child's daily routine. Choose the best time and place each evening for homework, and try to stick to it. Create a homework-friendly atmosphere away from distraction and full of supplies such as pencils, crayons, rulers and paper. Keep everything in one spot and help your child remember to put it back after homework is done. Make sure homework gets put in the backpack as soon as it is done.

Sleep tight. Kids this age need approximately 10 hours of sleep each night. Your child will be a better student if he or she is well-rested each day.
